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# Headmaster's Editorial

# In Touch With the Real World

**What are the challenges of roasting coffee in the Engadin at an altitude of 1700m above sea level? Why should the investment and building of a brandnew hotel in Pontresina eventually pay off? And would you want to invest into a business beyond the ordinary?**

These were only a few of the many questions asked by our IB Career Related Programme students to entrepreneurs as part of their international BTEC Level 3 Business Studies. Students were given the opportunity to meet with successful business people in the region, who explained their work and shared their experiences.

## MAISTRA 160 - HIGH ALPINE LIVING



On their first visit our students met with Bettina and Richard Plattner, who are currently building a brand-new hotel in the heart of Pontresina, the «Maistra 160 – High Alpine Living». The Engadin entrepreneurs talked about the challenges of the hospitality industry as well as its opportunities. They gave insights into the challenges they encountered and are still facing. The creation of their own brand, the marketing to target their customer group and the development of the hospitality spirit from theory to a sustainable, friendly and guest-centered business, were revelations for our students. The visit was concluded with a walk through the building site and a first glimpse of the spectacular and unique future open-roof wellness area.

## CAFÉ BADILATTI

The next visit led down the road to the Badilatti roasters. Everybody had already smelled gusts of freshly roasted coffee blowing up the valley and through open windows. Sabrina Cloesters, the young CEO of the Badilatti coffee firm, gave our students a thorough tour of the business. This included information about the packaging line, the raw coffee sto-



rage and a demonstration of a coffee batch being roasted. Our students learned about the green coffee trade and the immense fluctuation of prices. After a professional coffee testing session, the students discussed the opportunities and challenges of a coffee roaster located in a remote valley such as the Engadin. They were impressed that a seemingly small business in Zuoz would be so strongly connected to the world beyond the valley.

## ALGOR DANZA



Rinaldo Willy is an impressive young entrepreneur from Zuoz, who has achieved great success with different business models. After an apprenticeship and university, he founded his first company «Algordanza», a Memorial Diamond service that offers an alternative form of burial. It transforms the ashes of a loved one into a precious diamond. The young entrepreneur had to face great challenges, mainly due to legal and religious restrictions in many countries. Rinaldo Willy's first-hand account of his meetings with religious leaders of the world, about mastering the break of a taboo and promoting an open dialog about death and burial ceremonies, left a deep impression with our students. More so, because Algordanza is now a multi-million business operating in 30 countries all over the world.

# An Inspiring Collaboration Continues

On the 15<sup>th</sup> of March 2022, the Lyceum Alpinum was once again host to His Serene Highness Prince Philipp von und zu Liechtenstein, Mr. Olivier Pernet and the finalists of the LGT Project 2021/2022.



The final three teams were in attendance along with the rest of the IB1 and DIS 4 year groups, waiting in anticipation to see which ones would make the final two and the opportunity to present to their peers, his Highness and the assortment of Lyceum teachers and management. After a warm welcome and introduction from the headmaster Beat Sommer, his Serene Highness addressed the students linking history and development with opportunity and passion. After developing their ideas and projects for over five months, it was a shame to have to whittle the groups down to two, but such is the nature...

After announcing the two final groups, «Meducate» and «MonopoLAZ» the students prepared to present. The two teams had conceived of two potential ways to support and benefit communities. «Meducate» hoped to bring easy access and simple to understand medical information to poorer countries starting in central Africa, and «MonopoLAZ» focused on the closer to home community of

the school and its alumni through a custom board game designed to share info with new members of the community, reignite memories and potentially raise money to donate to an assortment of charities in the future. Both the groups acquitted themselves admirably and addressed a variety of ideas, developments and project management hurdles throughout their process of idea to hopeful realization.

Congratulations to all our student participants, especially MonopoLAZ (1<sup>st</sup>) and Meducate (2<sup>nd</sup>), and thank you to His Serene Highness Prince Philipp von und zu Liechtenstein, Mr. Olivier Pernet and the LGT bank for their continued investment of time, energy and expertise in our school through the LGT project. 


## WINTER WONDERLAND EXPERIENCE

### LAUNCHING THEIR OWN BUSINESSES




We foster innovation, creativity, risk taking and much more. DIS3 IGCSE Business Enterprise students complete an Enterprise project as part of their IGCSE project and 50% of their

final grade. Students work in three groups. This year, the students set up three businesses:

- **Anstyle Anyone Casaos** sold mobile phone cases
- **Super Smoothies** sold fresh smoothies
- **Saiko Cookies** sold fresh cookies.

The project requires students to research many ideas and carry out a SWOT and PEST analysis for each idea. As part of the planning, each group investigates the financial requirements of their business. They identify three possible sources of funding, set up a cash flow forecasts as well as profit and loss accounts and calculate their breakeven point. The students worked hard at their business ideas and it served as a valuable experience for their future careers.


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
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# Wer an Griechenland denkt...


Wer an Griechenland denkt, sieht vermutlich zuallererst ein klares Bild von weissen Häusern und azurblauem Meer vor seinem inneren Auge. Man denkt an Feta Käse, Gyros und Oliven, an Rotwein und Sonnenschein. Von all dem haben wir auf unserer Griechenland Reise mit der kleinen Latein-Klasse natürlich auch eine Kostprobe bekommen. Wir haben aber auch gelernt, dass Griechenland so viel mehr als das ist und so viel mehr verborgen und für uns bereithält.



Griechenland ist eine riesige Zeitkapsel. Jede Steinmauer, jede Statue, jede Seitengasse scheint ihre eigene faszinierende Geschichte zu erzählen, der wir gespannt lauschen durften. So lernten wir in Thessaloniki an einem Tag über die vielschichtige Vergangenheit einer Stadt, die von Osmanen bis zu Römern alles schon mal erlebt zu haben schien, und wenige Tage später sagte uns das Orakel von Delphi unsere Zukunft voraus, ja fast so zuverlässig wie unsere Wetterapp uns Sonnenschein prophezeite. Mit etwas Fantasie konnte man in Korinth alte Einkaufsgassen entdecken, auch wenn keine passende Toga für uns dabei war. In Kalambaka reichten die Berge so hoch, dass es uns schon fast bekannt vorkam, während uns der Ausblick von den Metéora-Klöstern dennoch den Atem verschlug. In Olympia konnten wir zwischen idyllischer und friedvoller Natur im Schatten des Athene-Tempels in die Fussstapfen von alten Sportlern treten, wobei wir blass zusehen mussten, dass wir beim Sprint nicht über unsere eigenen Achillesfersen stolperten. Und auf der Insel Zakynthos stand nach einer für Griechenland beinahe schon obligatorischen Bootsfahrt noch Entspannung auf dem Programm.

Wenn wir nun an Griechenland denken, sehen wir zwar nach wie vor das wunderschöne Meer aber auch deutlich mehr klar vor uns. Wir spüren die Gastfreundlichkeit und Wärme, mit der wir willkommen geheissen wurden, und mit einem zufriedenen Lächeln wissen wir nun «Efcharistó» zu sagen.

# A Life-Changing Trip

In May 2022, 14 students and three staff travelled to the Chikwawa region of southern Malawi where they worked with schoolchildren in local schools and took part in community projects.



With only a handful of international connections, Malawi is not an easy place to reach. We travel overnight from Italy, through Ethiopia and Zambia, before we reach Chileka airport, in southern Malawi. Most of us have not slept. But as we leave the airport and begin the drive to our accommodation, tiredness seems irrelevant as our minds take in the sights and sounds of southern Africa. We drive through a landscape of warm, red earth and thick patches of long grass. Malawi has reached the end of its wet season and from the bus we look out on verdant rolling hills.

## THE WARM HEART OF AFRICA

Our accommodation is Fisherman's Rest, a simple but comfortable lodge, set in a forest and overlooking the Great Rift Valley. The sky is a burnt orange when we arrive. The sun is setting over Mozambique in the distance, and tired and hungry as they are, the students allow themselves to be awed by the spectacle. Then it is dinner time. The cook, a permanently smiling man called Blessings, has lit a fire – this region is 1000 metres above sea level and evenings cool down quickly. Blessings serves us sweet potatoes, yams and vegetable curry. It is a simple but tasty meal and as we eat by the fireplace, it is easy to understand why Malawi has become known as «the warm heart of Africa».

But Malawi is not simply warm, friendly and beautiful. It is one of the poorest countries in the world. It is small and densely-populated and the need to feed a population of 19 million means that most people work in agriculture. Only one third go to secondary school. It is a low-income economy with many people earning \$1 a day. The country is vulnerable to climactic shocks. Just before we arrive, intense rainfall caused flooding which damaged infrastructure and the power supply. Some school children have not been to school for several weeks, because bridges have been swept away and rivers are uncrossable. There will be a power cut every day that we are in Malawi. It is precisely to understand such issues and see how they affect ordinary Malawians that we are here.

## THE CHILDREN ARE HAPPY TO BE AT SCHOOL

We spend our mornings in local schools and it is hard not to be overwhelmed by the welcome we receive. As soon as it arrives, our bus is surrounded by excited children waving and chanting in unison azungu! or «foreigner». Their joy at our presence is moving. And it is palpable the whole time we are in a school. Lyceum students read stories, sing, play football and do crafts with the Malawian children. We also help to distribute phala, cornmeal porridge. Many schools in this

area are part of feeding programmes and in return for attending schools, children receive a daily cup of warm porridge. For some, it may be their only meal of the day. The classrooms in the schools we visit are dark, and do not have tables or chairs. Children sit on the floor. There is a shortage of equipment, a shortage of materials, a shortage of teachers. The only thing there is no shortage of are students, who may number 50 to a class, and who may have walked two hours to get to school. And yet the children are clearly happy to be here. In fact, this is one of the things that makes the biggest impression on our group. As Yang (IB student) says, «I will never forget the students, their intelligence and bright and friendly personalities». Wolf (IB student) also says that «the journey the students make to get an education and their eagerness to do so left a deep impression on me».

In the afternoons, we leave the schools and go into villages to help with community projects. In one village we help to repair a bore hole and pump, restoring the supply of clean water. In another, we build a stove with clay and bricks. The simplicity of life in these villages, which is based on subsistence agriculture, is striking when you have travelled from a place with the kind of material wealth we are accustomed to in Switzerland. But just as striking are the friendly, welcoming people.

## AN ABUNDANCE OF LAUGHTER, WARMTH AND HUMAN SPIRIT

Time and again over the two weeks we are here, we are struck by this contrast between material paucity and the abundance of laughter, warmth and human spirit. This, more

than anything, is what Malawi teaches us. As Anouk (Matura student) says, «I never thought I would find such pure happiness in one of the poorest countries in the world. Now I can never forget that material possessions do not bring happiness.»

Sadly, and inevitably, our short time here comes to an end. It is natural that as students and teachers we ask ourselves whether we have made a difference. But given the depth and scope of the problems that Malawi faces, it is arrogant, perhaps, to focus on whether we helped in the short time we were here, and perhaps it misses the point. What we can say with certainty is that we connected, we understood and we grew. We took a small, first step in a complex landscape. My hope as a teacher is that some of the participants will one day find a way to continue the journey they began in the warm heart of Africa.

# The International Bronze Award Adventurous Journey

As their final challenge in the International Bronze Award, students from the International and Matura sections were required to complete a practice and assessed hike and camp.



This is the culmination of a year-long project that started in October 2021, involving students defining specific goals of skill, sport, and volunteering. 20 students started the project, and 15 students will collect their Bronze Award at the end of the school year. The International Award is a voluntary organisation that encourages students to get more involved with the school community and to take part in extra-curricular activities.

Students first spent a night at the local campsite of Chapella for their practice hike to make sure that they were prepared for the challenging adventure hike the following weekend. Students had also been following a training programme at lunchtimes for two months.



On the second assessed hike, the final adventurous journey, students walked from St Moritz to Maloja, an 18 km hike, and returned to Sils Maria the following day. Students were expected to carry all their own equipment and to navigate a route of their own choosing. Students met their teachers at checkpoints along the way, but were completely autonomous in planning what they were going to eat and the transport they needed to take.

It was a fantastic experience for the students, some of whom had never spent time hiking or even sightseeing this beautiful part of the Engadin. For over 200 years, Sils Maria has been a popular holiday destination for writers and thinkers, Nietzsche and Thomas Huxley to name two. The students were equally inspired by this impressive valley.




# Unvergessliche Summer Camp Erlebnisse

Während in anderen Schulen während der Sommerferien wenig Betrieb ist, wimmelt es im Speisesaal, in den Internatshäusern, auf den Sportplätzen und in den Gängen des Lyceum Alpinum nur so von Kindern.



Vier Wochen dauerte das diesjährige 26. Summer Camp, wobei manche der Kids zwei und andere vier Wochen an den Camps teilnahmen. Das Alter liegt zwischen zehn und sechzehn Jahren, die Nationalitäten könnten unterschiedlicher nicht sein. Die Kinder reisten aus Mexico, Spanien, der Türkei, Russland, Italien, Japan, Thailand, der Ukraine, Deutschland, der Schweiz und aus der Region an und kamen in Zuoz zusammen.

Während der gleichen Zeit fanden die einwöchigen Junior Day Camps statt, wo Kinder zwischen sechs und neun Jahren betreut wurden. «Wir machen diese Camps nun seit sechs Jahren und es ist schön zu sehen, dass wir immer mehr Teilnehmende haben, vor allem auch aus der Region», sagt

Camille, eine der Leiterinnen. Neben vielen internationalen Kindern, deren Eltern Ferien im Engadin verbringen, nahmen auch zahlreiche Kinder aus der Region an den Junior Day Camps teil. Die Kleinen wurden von Montag bis Freitag jeweils um 8.30 Uhr von ihren Eltern gebracht und um 16.00 Uhr wieder abgeholt. Die Camps konnten für eine bis vier Wochen gebucht werden.

Morgens standen, wie auch für die Kinder des Summer Camps, Sprachkurse in Englisch und Deutsch an. Die Zweisprachigkeit und Internationalität sind ja typische Merkmale der Schule. Die Kids wurden nach Niveau eingeteilt, um so die bestmöglichen individuellen Lernfortschritte zu ermöglichen. Gegessen wurde im Speisesaal, wobei die ungefähr

35 Kinder des Junior Day Camps vor der grossen Gruppe des Summer Camps eingeteilt waren. Nachmittags standen verschiedenste Aktivitäten an, die von Tag zu Tag variierten. Zwischen 12.45 Uhr und 16.00 Uhr begaben sich die Kinder mit ihren Supervisors auf kleine Abenteuer. Dazu gehörten unter anderem die Hüpfburgen in Samedan und der Seilpark in Pontresina, wo die Kinder hoch in den Lüften herumturnten, River Rafting auf dem Inn von Madulain bis S-chanf, ein Highlight für alle, Bowling in S-chanf, das Museum des Nationalparks in Zernez sowie Sport und eine Mini-Olympiade auf dem Campus, wo die Kinder gegeneinander wetteiferten. Zudem nahmen die kleinen Gäste an einem «Forest Experience» teil, wo die Kinder Unterschlupfe bauten, Feuer machten und daran Marshmallows brieten. Ausserdem wurde die Kreativität mithilfe von Kunst, Brettspielen oder Handarbeit gefördert. «Die Sportaktivitäten haben mir sehr gefallen, vor allem das River Rafting», sagt Laurin, einer der jungen Teilnehmer. «Das Essen und das Znuni waren so lecker und der Abschluss in der Backstube war eine coole Sache», fügt er an.

Durch die steigende Nachfrage gewinnen die Junior Day Camps, neben den bekannten Summer Camps für die älteren Kinder und Jugendlichen, immer mehr an Bedeutung, auch wenn die Kinder nicht über Nacht bleiben, sondern abends wieder abgeholt werden. «Mich hat es gefreut zu sehen, dass die Kinder schon nach dem ersten Tag eine



Bindung hatten und sich untereinander wohl fühlten», sagt Yanik, ein Maturand der Schule, der als Fotograf der Summer und der Junior Day Camps dabei war. «Das sieht man auch auf den Fotos. Es scheint, als würden sie sich schon seit Jahren kennen, was auch die Aktivitäten lebendiger gemacht hat.»

Gerlinde Haas war über 20 Jahre lang am Lyceum Alpinum tätig. Zuerst als Internatsleiterin in der Chesa Arpiglia, dann viele Jahre im Sekretariat hat sie unsere Schule mitgeprägt und war für viele eine verlässliche Konstante im oft turbulenten Alltag. Nun geht Gerlinde in Pension. Bevor wir sie in die nächste Phase ihres aktiven Lebens ziehen lassen, wollten wir von ihr wissen, wie sie auf die vergangenen Jahre zurückblickt.



## WAS HAT DICH AN DER ARBEIT ALS INTERNATSLEITERIN BESONDERS FASZINIERT?

Als ich 1998 im Mädcheninternat anfing, hatte ich meine Familie in Deutschland zurückgelassen. Das Lyceum Alpinum, vor allem aber die Mädchen im Internat, wurden zu meiner neuen, zweiten Familie.

Faszinierend war für mich die Vielfalt an Lebensgeschichten, mit denen ich konfrontiert wurde. Ich verstand die Arbeit im Internat nicht einfach als Job, sondern war vielmehr von Anfang an bereit, mich mit den Mädchen auseinanderzusetzen, ihren Eigenheiten und Nöten, ihren ganz speziel-

len Lebenssituationen und Sensibilitäten zu stellen. Durch Zuhören und Empathie erhält man Vertrauen, nicht durch Fordern oder Insistieren. Wer wollte, konnte bei mir und meinem Team eine Art Ersatzfamilie finden, musste aber nicht. Lernen konnte bei uns jede/r, dass man die Regeln kennen sollte, bevor man sie bricht, und mit Selbstbewusstsein und Eigenverantwortung dazu zu stehen, wenn man einen anderen Weg gewählt hat.

Berührend war für mich die Erfahrung, dass gegenseitiger Respekt und Wertschätzung Herzen öffnen und Freundschaften fürs Leben schaffen können.

## **DU HAST VIELE SOMMER LANG GEMEINSAM MIT DEINEM PARTNER BERGHÜTTEN GEFÜHRT. WIE PASST DAS INS GESAMTBILD?**

Während meiner Internatsjahre ist mir klar geworden, dass diese herausfordernde und oft auch belastende Tätigkeit nach einigen Jahren eine Auszeit braucht, um nicht abzustumpfen, um die jährlich neuen Lebensgeschichten nicht irgendwann als beliebige weitere von vielen abzuheken. Der Schulabschluss meines jüngsten Sohnes war mir daher idealer Zeitpunkt für meinen Abschied aus dem Internat und dem «Erziehungswesen». Dass ich das Lyceum dann 2003 zwei Jahre früher verliess als geplant, lag an der unterschiedlichen Erziehungsauffassung von mir und der damaligen Schulleitung. Ich war nicht bereit, meine Werte von Freiheit, Eigenverantwortung und Respekt füreinander zugunsten eines repressiven Erziehungsstils aufzugeben.

Meine «Auszeit» nahm ich zusammen mit meinem Partner auf einer Hütte des Schweizer Alpen Clubs. Schon während meiner fünf Internatsjahre hatte ich ihm immer wieder auf einer Hütte geholfen, und so manifestierte sich auch der Wunsch, irgendwann einmal gemeinsam diese Herausforderung zu wagen. Auch in einer Hütte mit bis zu 70 Gästen übernimmst du eine grosse Verantwortung; erfolgreich bist du dann, wenn du bei allen Sorgen um Infrastruktur und Wirtschaftlichkeit nicht vergisst, dass du Gastgeber mit Leidenschaft bist und jeder Besucher einzigartig ist und deine Aufmerksamkeit verdient. Wir waren erfolgreich, ein gutes Team. Aber die Arbeit ist körperlich anstrengend, sie hat mich sehr gefordert. Daher kam mir das Angebot des damaligen Prorektors wie gerufen, ans Lyceum Alpinum zurückzukehren.

## **WAS WAR DAS SCHÖNSTE AN DEINER ARBEIT IM SCHULSEKRETARIAT?**

Die Arbeit im Schulsekretariat seit Januar 2006 fand ich von Anfang an spannend und überaus abwechslungsreich, und sie ist es bis zum Schluss geblieben. 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# Under General Suspicion

In March, the English Theatre Company gave a brilliant performance of Anders Lustgarten's play «Extremism».



These past two years, the English Theatre Company went through turbulent times. Plays were rehearsed, premieres were imminent, and then performances and eventually entire productions were cancelled. But most students persevered and stayed on board. They now put on a play that was all the more impressive and required a lot of personal engagement.

«Extremism», a work by the British author and political activist Anders Lustgarten, is a text about fear, friendship, creeping polarisation and terrorism. It addresses above all the question of how to prevent the increasing radicalisation of young people. «Extremism» goes to the heart of the matter, the experimental set-up and the school class are like a biotope of our society. The play addresses the question of what happens when people are suddenly under general suspicion because of their affiliation to a country, religious belief or their personal conviction. The protagonists get caught in a spiral of suspicion, fear, accusations and violence.

The plot develops rather unspectacularly. A fellow pupil is arrested by a police anti-terrorism unit for suspicion of radicalisation. The teacher has left the room to speak to the police officers. Unsupervised, the students start speculating about Jamal, the suspect. Little by little, suspicions rise, accusations culminate in racism and there is massive bullying. The voices of the few sensible students are drowned out.

The ten students of the English Theatre Company gave a great ensemble performance. Every role was well casted and played. The audience was mesmerised by the incredibly dense play. The young actors showed full commitment, undivided concentration and the power of persuasion – one could only marvel. For this strong performance, the entire cast deserved a great round of applause.


# IB2 Visual Arts Exhibition



We all stayed at the Omni Parker House, in the heart of the city and a legendary symbol in downtown Boston since 1855. Close by Tatte Bakery became «the place to be» for breakfast!



On Thursday, May 5 we headed by private bus under the guidance of Kelley from Cambridge Historical Tours to Rhode Island and toured first The Breakers, the grandest of Newport's summer cottages and a symbol of the Vanderbilt family's pre-eminence in the Gilded Age. After lunch at the Lobster Bar we enjoyed a guided visit of the Belcourt Castle, only open for a few private tours. Brenton Point State Park and the Portuguese Discovery Monument right at the Ocean were a welcome short stop before driving back to Boston. Some of us met up for dinner at the Irish pub «Emmets», a real fun place!



Walking the Freedom Trail for three hours was Friday morning's focus. Daniel, our super guide (and founder of the Cambridge Historical Tours) made history come alive and draw an interested crowd wherever we stopped. It was like watching the Musical Hamilton being performed in the streets of Boston! After so much information and details about the multifaceted history of this area we well deserved a break at the Ristorante Fiore in the Italian North End. Filippo had to try the spaghetti alle vongole ... it held up to the test!

In the evening we ventured to the Union Oyster House for such traditional dishes as Clam Chowder, Cherrystone clams, cornbread, Broiled Boston Scrod and apple cobbler. The charming place is a National Historic Landmark and America's oldest restaurant (since 1826).



On Saturday morning, after breakfast for all in the meeting room, the Board held its meeting while a small group explored Beacon Hill and the Back Bay with guide Sam. The afternoon was free for individual adventures before we congregated at Joe's Waterfront right at the harbor for the mouthwatering Lobster Feast! Prime rib, haddock and Waterfront bouillabaisse tried to compete but to little avail.

Sunday brought Act Two by super-guide Daniel delving the whole day into the revolutionary history outside Boston. We

took our private bus first to Harvard and MIT, continued on the Battle Road to Lexington Green, to Concord and the Minute Man National Park and the North Bridge - the site of the first day of battle in the American War of Independence. I have been to those places many times but never ever experienced them with such a mesmerizing history performance! The «shot heard round the world» on April 19, 1775 came alive right in front of us!



On Monday seven of us changed gear and headed to the North Shore in the «Zuoz Mobil» aka our car with license plate «Zuoz»! We visited Gloucester – the US oldest seaport fishing town and an artist community since 19<sup>th</sup> century (Edward Hopper, Winslow Homer, John Sloan), Rockport with the red barn – known as «motif No 1» – located at the Bradley Wharf and «the most often painted building in America». Stopped at Halibut Point with an amazing view on the Ocean and with Babson Farm Granite Quarry, used to build the Brooklyn Bridge in NYC and the Customs Tower in Boston. Of course we «had» to stop at another lobster shack in Essex! Next on the schedule was the «Salem and Witchcraft Historical Walking Tour» with eclectic guide Jeff explaining the history around the 1692 witch trials. Heading back to Boston for the goodbyes felt really sad. Paul and Angelika Adams and Conrad Schoeffter stayed on for another day but everybody else had to leave or had left already the day before.

# Serene Summer Games 2022

A sentiment of gratitude and serenity was in the air at the Summer Games 2022. Gratitude for the possibility to play sports and enjoy evening festivities without restrictions.



The past two years of the pandemic left most of us longing for a return to normality and having the chance to meet old and new friends from around the world once again in the place which most of us call home away from home. We are thankful that the Summer Games 2022 could finally be held again in full format, underlined by great attendance from a variety of old girls and boys, their families and friends, as well as staff and students of the Lyceum Alpinum.

### GOLF TOURNAMENT

As usual, we kicked-off the event with Friday's golf tournament in Zuoz where the students showed a strong performance and took home the win. The evening's prize-giving ceremony and dinner at Dorta offered a great platform for golfers and visitors alike to get together, while some of us competed in the evening soccer game at the Lyceum. The Zuoz Club pushed hard against the physically superior students but lacked the stamina to hold on to a 4:4, leaving the field one goal down.

### FOOTBALL

The Old Boys football team seemed to adapt to the high altitude faster than usual this year. This was probably due to the fact that there were many «young» Old Boys in the



football team and that no Dracula Party had consumed their energy the night before. It was a fair game at eye level. The school team led early on by two goals, however the Old Boys were able to catch up. The outstanding performance of goal getter Eric Debrunner scored 2 goals. The reliable goalkeeper, Christoph Semmelmann, held one penalty and reversed over 30 shots to his goal. Accordingly, the result was very close. The school team won the game in the end 6:5.

### FIVES AND VOLLEYBALL

The Fives matches were held on Saturday morning this year in order to allow for more spectators during the cricket matches on Al. In no other sport, age groups are as diversely mixed, the youngest student was just 12 years old, while Old Boy Erkki Tammivuori could easily keep up at 76. The first school team played against Niklas Döbler and Philipp Sauer. The two Old Boys with many years of experience didn't miss a beat and won in two sets 12:4 and 12:2. While the Old Boys and Old Girls won many games, it is worth noting that the school's Fives team has made significant progress with the mentoring of Fives teacher Matt Wisemann. It is therefore important that the school team can continue to gain as much tournament experience as possible (Geneva, Zurich and England) in order to challenge the Old Boys again next year.

Parallel to the action in the Fives Courts, the students held their ground at the Volleyball match, confidently beating the Club.

### CRICKET AND HOW WE PLAYED THE GAME!



While the barbecues were fired up, the first and second cricket teams gathered on Al to compete in 25 overs in the Summer Games' unofficial main event. With 22 experienced and highly motivated Old Boys and Girls, the school had to face some fierce bowlers and batsmen. Despite putting up



a great fight and showing fantastic sportsmanship, the Lyceum could not overcome the accurate bowling and solid batting of the Club's first eleven.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> team of the Old Boys cricket team was allowed to play against an all-women's team from the Lyceum for the first time. This has never happened before at the Summer Games, we are sure that Gordon Spencer would have been overjoyed! The bowling of the school team was very precise, kicking out many Old Boys before the end of the game. During their turn of batting the bowling skills of captain Michael Rosendahl and Old Boy Constantin Wizemann, gave room to only very few runs. Alexander Heuberger was able to achieve no less than 6 wickets, giving the school team a hard time. End the end the result of the game did not matter, but how we played the game and the fun that we had will probably stay in our memories for a long time.

### PRIZE-GIVING CEREMONY AND AWARDS



The athletic part of the Summer Games concluded with a speech by headmaster Beat Sommer, as well as the Zuoz Club's president and sports captain at the prize-giving ceremony. The Club's trophy for the best all-rounder went to Eric Debrunner, who competed strongly in golf, soccer and cricket. Best cricketer award was given this year to Niklas Doebler for scoring several wickets and solid runs in the first team.

While the students showed their forte in golf, soccer and volleyball, the overwhelming victories of the Zuoz Club in the traditional games of cricket and Fives gave the Old Boys and Girls an edge to take home the Spencer Trophy in 2022. It was a highlight of the Summer Games 2022 and our utmost pleasure to show our gratitude and appreciation for the outstanding work as head of school to our dear member Beat Sommer, by awarding him the Benny Oei Trophy. The trophy is given to members who show great sportsmanship in the

larger sense of the Spirit of Zuoz and who contribute to the community in an exceptional way.

# Old Zuozers Visit London for Eton Fives (And Real Tennis)

A group of six Old Zuozers made a trip to the home of Eton Fives to play against and with our Fives friends from London – and also to be introduced to the game of real tennis (once known as jeu de paume).



Filippo Variola and Alexandre de Senger from the Geneva branch of the club and Pavel Penev, David Lemle, Felix Büchi and Leon Schoenleber from Zurich joined the Old Citizens (old boys of the City of London School – founded 1442 – which is situated in the shadow of St Paul’s Cathedral) for a four day programme of events and entertainments.



These included a black tie dinner at the magnificent Royal Automobile Club in Pall Mall (it was the annual dinner of the Eton Fives Association), an introduction to the ancient game of real tennis on a 17<sup>th</sup> century court at Hampton Court Palace in west London, a game against the Old Citizens at Eton College itself,

and participation in the OCs’ annual end-of-season tournament for the Adams Cup, which was won by David Lemle (in partnership with one of the hosts, Stephen Kelly).

The Fives players from the Lyceum and the Old Citizens have had a friendship for nearly a century: A team from Zuoz visited England in the 1920s and one of the teams they played then was the Old Citizens, at Queen’s Club.

Then, in the 1950s, an OC team visited Zuoz and continued to do so annually for several decades – a photograph of one of the early teams, featuring a Union Jack, is still hanging in the Hall of Fame at the Lyceum.

These days the Old Zuozers Fives team and the Old Citizens compete for a trophy called the Hawken-Garrett Cup, named after two of the gentlemen who came to play fives in those days (the current tally is six-five to the Englishmen). And Old Citizens are regular visitors to the two Zuoz Fives tournaments held every year in Geneva and Zurich.

# Wir nehmen Abschied

**Rolf Herzog, L'1956 – 1965**



Unser lieber Freund und Klassenkamerad Rolf ist in seinem 77. Lebensjahr nach langer, schwerer Krankheit am 20. August 2021 von uns gegangen. Mit viel Optimismus und Geduld hat er die letzten Jahre mit seiner Erkrankung gelebt. Dank der fortgeschrittenen Medizin und der liebevollen Fürsorge seiner Frau Eva konnte er die letzten Jahre dennoch mit guter Lebensqualität geniessen. Rolf hat bis zu seinem letzten Atemzug alles - auch seinen Abschied – organisiert. Das war Rolf!

Unser Klassenkamerad war bereits als Elfjähriger zusammen mit seinem jüngeren Bruder Thomas nach Zuoz gekommen und hat somit fast seine gesamte Schulzeit im Lyceum verbracht. Die Mittelschule hat er 1965 mit der Handelsmatura abgeschlossen. Im Anschluss daran studierte er an der Handelshochschule in St. Gallen zusammen mit einigen Klassenkameraden und schloss als lic. oec HSG ab. Bereits während der Studienzeit lernte er seine erste Frau Liz kennen, heiratete und wurde glücklicher Vater von drei Söhnen. Neben Familie, Beruf und Sport hatte Rolf schon früh ein grosses Hobby - er war ein begeisterter Privatpilot. Obwohl er in der zweiten Lebenshälfte nicht mehr selber als solcher aktiv war, hat er dieses Hobby in den letzten Jahren wieder aktiviert und es bis zuletzt gepflegt. Dazu installierte er sich in seinem Fitnessraum einen Flugsimulator und ist mit seinen Freunden vor oder nach einem Apéro in viele Städte Europas und nach Übersee «geflogen». Er wollte körperlich und geistig fit bleiben. Rolf war ein sehr grosszügiger Gastgeber und verstand es immer, das Leben zusammen mit Freunden zu geniessen.

Bruno hat als externer Klassenkamerad und Freund Rolf mit den folgenden Zeilen sehr trefflich charakterisiert:

«Nach Abschluss der Sekundarschule Zuoz war ich gespannt, was mich im Lyceum Alpinum erwarten würde. Unsere Klasse H3/H4 war ein Sammelsurium aus Schülerinnen und Schülern aus acht Nationen. So bin ich vor über 60 Jahren als externer Schüler aus der vertrauten Gemeindeschule in ein völlig neues, heterogenes Umfeld geraten. Unser erster Klassensprecher war Rolf Herzog. Offensichtlich hatte unser Klassenlehrer erkannt, welche Eigenschaften in ihm stecken. Rolf war selbstbewusst, schlagfertig und humorvoll und sorgte stets für gute Stimmung, was wir Mitschüler sehr zu schätzen wussten und was für den Zusammenhalt und für den Klassengeist sehr förderlich war.

Nach unserer Mittelschulzeit wurde es im Klassenumfeld still, bis einzelne von uns vermehrt begannen, sich an die gemeinsame Schulzeit zurückzuerinnern. So kam es 1975 - anlässlich des 10-jährigen Jubiläums unserer Matura - auf Initiative von Rolf zum ersten gemeinsamen Wiedersehen auf der Rigi. Es sollte der Beginn einer Serie von zahlreichen Zusammenkünften sein, die oft mehrere Tage dauerten. Wo auch immer ein Treffen stattfand, Rolf war immer dabei und meist auch als Organisator massgeblich daran beteiligt. Er kümmerte sich stets um die neuesten Adressen und Telefonnummern seiner ehemaligen Mitschüler und Mitschülerinnen und telefonierte regelmässig rund um den Globus um zu erfahren, wie es ihnen ging. Rolf war ein glänzender Unterhalter, hatte jedoch auch die Begabung, seinen Mitmenschen aufmerksam zuzuhören, an ihrem Schicksal teilzunehmen und, wo Not war, zu helfen. Besonders lustig ging es jeweils zu und her, wenn es um Episoden aus der Schulzeit ging. Dies war auch dann noch der Fall, als er längst schon von einer unheilbaren Krankheit befallen war. So war es auch bei unserer letzten Klassenzusammenkunft im Dezember 2018 in der Kronenhalle in Zürich.

Rolf fühlte sich seit seiner Schulzeit im Lyceum eng mit dem Engadin verbunden. Hier fühlte er sich wohl. In der wunderbaren, rauen Natur suchte und fand er immer wieder Erholung und inneren Frieden. Hier wollte er auch seine letzte Ruhe finden. Als ich mich zusammen mit Roebi, zwei Tage vor seinem Tod, definitiv von ihm verabschieden durfte, verriet er mir den Ort, an dem er seine Asche verstreut haben wollte. Ich versprach ihm, ihn dort zu besuchen.»

Wir werden Rolf als treuen, wertvollen und grosszügigen Freund in Erinnerung behalten.

**Harald Kümpers, L'1951–1958**



Unerwartet verstarb am 12. Februar 2022 Harald Kümpers in seinem 85. Lebensjahr. Harald verbrachte die Jahre 1951 – 1958 im Lyceum Alpinum in Zuoz. Er entstammte einer bekannten Textilfamilie aus dem westfälischen Rheine.

Sein ausgeglichenes und freundliches Wesen machte ihn im ganzen Internat beliebt. Er engagierte sich sehr für das Lyceum aber auch für seine Mitschüler. In Würdigung dieser Eigenschaften wurde er 1955 zum Vicecaptain des Hauses Helvetia und 1957 zum Schoolcaptain gewählt. Darüber hinaus pflegte er enge Kontakte zu den Einheimischen. Harald Kümpers glänzte auch durch sportliches Engagement, so wurde er 1956 Keeper of Fives. Bei den Leichtathletik-Sporttagen 1953 errang er Platz 3 im Fünfkampf. Er war außerdem von 1955 bis 1957 Mitglied der Cricket- und Hockey-Schulmannschaft. Die Liebe zur Natur, den Tieren, den Bergen und dem Meer begleitete ihn stets.

Sein guter Schulfreund Paul Wilhelm Epping beschreibt durch die nachfolgenden Zeilen die Würdigung und Vorzüge des Menschen Harald Kümpers, wie folgt:

«Harald war meine erste Kontaktperson, als ich 1954 ins Lyceum eintrat. Vielleicht war es unsere westfälische Seelenverwandtschaft, die ihn zu meinem engsten Freund werden liess. Sein ausgeglichenes, immer freundliches Wesen war sein Kapi-

tal, welches ihn im ganzen Internat beliebt machte. Wir waren nicht nur in derselben Klasse, sondern auch Zimmernachbarn im House Helvetia. Auch ausserhalb des Schul- und Lyceumsbetriebs verbrachten wir viel Zeit miteinander. Unvergessen bleibt unsere gemeinsame und ebenso denkwürdige Reise mit Käspi Kindlimann und mit «Knochen» Spencer kreuz und quer durch England in seinem kleinen Austin Seven, wo wir wie Sardinen eingepfercht sassen. Niemals konnten wir mehr in und über England erfahren. Auch als Old Boys unternahmen Harald und ich gemeinsame Bergtouren.

Wenn wir uns in den letzten Jahren auch kaum gesehen hatten, verging jedoch kein Geburtstag des anderen - wo immer wir uns auch befanden – ohne die jährliche Gratulation und Glückwünschen für ein langes Leben verbunden mit einem längeren Plausch zum neuesten Stand der Dinge. Allen, die ihn kannten, wird er unvergessen bleiben.»

Nach dem Abitur in Zuoz studierte Harald in Köln und Reutlingen Betriebs- und Textilwirtschaft. Nach erfolgreichem Abschluss übernahm er die Leitung der ererbten Textilfabrik (Spinnerei, Weberei) in Rheine. Er erweiterte das Unternehmen mit neuen Textilfirmen in Deutschland später auch in Südafrika. Gleichzeitig vergrößerte er das Bauvolumen und die Anzahl der Vermietungen in der bestehenden Wohnungsgesellschaft. Des Weiteren begann er eine hochwertige, sehr erfolgreiche Glasveredelung.

Seine weltweiten Geschäftsreisen und Kontakte führten ihn nach Italien, Frankreich, die USA, Japan und Australien. Überall auf der Welt schloss er großartige und ein ganzes Leben andauernde Freundschaften. Im Laufe der Geschäftsbeziehungen entstand zwischen ihm und seinen Kunden ein vertrauensvolles Verhältnis: Je größer die Probleme, umso lieber kamen die Kunden vertrauensvoll zu Harald, der stets weitsichtig, geduldig, humorvoll, liebenswürdig und voller Ideen ihnen gerne weiterhalf. - Seine aktive Teilnahme und große Wissbegierde blieben bis zum letzten Tag seines Lebens.

Am 11. November 2022 wäre Harald Kümpers 85 Jahre alt geworden. Tiefe Dankbarkeit, noble Wertschätzung und wunderschöne Erinnerungen werden uns stets begleiten.

Unsere tiefempfundene Anteilnahme gilt besonders seiner lieben Frau Gilla und seinen Angehörigen.


